




TAX HELP



This year, tax returns were prepared and submitted for 219 ARCA individuals by a brilliant community of volunteers. Once again, 43 Beta Alpha Psi student volunteers from UNM Anderson School of Management spent 155 hours preparing 185 returns and reviewing 94 returns. An additional 12 volunteers from the professional community, including Atkinson, REDW, UNM ASM and ARCA volunteered over 43 hours preparing and reviewing returns. Federal refunds for individuals exceeded \$22,000 and New Mexico refunds were over \$25,000.

The entire process went exceedingly well. Thanks to everyone's skill and efficiency, we beat our anticipated time with few corrections and did not have to amend any submitted returns due to incorrect or missing information. Great job Preparers and Reviewers!
